# Apple Harvest


Once again we will have the Tompkins County 4-H Cultural Exchange Club here selling their almost-fa-

We are very happy to



#### **Breadseed Poppies**

The spectacular breadseed poppies (*Papaver somniferum*) have been in bloom in our gardens. The large, peony-like flower stands majestically above its blue-gray foliage. These are annuals that self-seed and will appear almost anywhere the next year. We harvest the seed in late July and August and have them available for sale in mid-August.

Just scatter the seeds on top of the ground this fall and you will have gorgeous poppies next June. Do not mulch heavily. Seed packets cost \$2.50 or \$3.00 if you wish to have them mailed to you. Just stop by and leave your address and let us know if you want the pink or red poppies.

# Garden Tip

I know sometimes I repeat my garden tip but I do it because I want to remind you about something very important that we probably discussed in the spring and you need to do now, in the fall. If you have a plant or shrub that didn't flower right for you when it was supposed to, now is the time to apply Triple phosphate. It will help with the root growth and promote better flowering in the spring. Also mulching helps a lot. It holds the right moisture our plants need. All plants, trees or shrubs need some water in their root system before they go dormant to protect them through the winter and to assure a healthy plant, tree or shrub for the spring.

# **Herbal Garden Tip**

Don't forget! Before we get a hard frost, collect that last batch of basil to make pesto. Make lots of pesto, freeze them in ice cube trays. When frozen put into a sealed bag and continue to make more. Great way to have lots of pesto. Also be sure to bring in any of the tender perennial herbs you want to keep inside for the winter. Don't forget rosemary loves a cooler room with light. Lemon verbena will usually drop all its leaves and look like it is dead but it isn't, it is just dormant. Sometime in late February or early March it will start to leaf out again. Have fun with your herbs.



# Fall Bulbs

The ideal time to plant your bulbs is from now until the ground freezes. We continue to carry the old standbys, but this year I am getting in some new and unique cultivars of Hyacinth, Tulip, Narcissus, Muscari, Iris, Scilla, Anemone, and Crocus. We still will carry the spectacular Giganteum alliums that you see in our gardens during the summer. Also for those of you that see our Colchicums in the fall, now is the time to buy them. Colchicums are a fall blooming crocus that comes up in September with no leaves and just a large lavender flower. They are simply breathtaking as the perennials are beginning to go dormant and these spring-like bulbs appear. Also,

many of you love our display of unusual bulbs that pop up in the spring. Cathy will continue to dig some of the more unusual bulbs out of Mom's gardens and sell them potted and in flower in the early spring. ## **Beneficial Insects in all of our Retail Greenhouses**

It was an exciting year here. As you all know, for several years now we have been working with IPM labs in Locke to attract beneficials to our greenhouse to control the bad insects. Well this year we worked with IPM Labs to use beneficials in all 3 greenhouses. We have learned a lot and just love some of the results we got. We also learned some failures but have a better idea how to do it next year. Each week we had Michelle Ten Eyck, our scout from IPM Labs, scout our greenhouses for insects and report to us on the pest/natural enemy balance. I know some of you wonder why we call her a scout. The reason is that is just what she does; she scouts in greenhouses for early detection and action nipped pest populations quickly. At Michelle's suggestion, we would use a beneficial to control the problem or plant material would be used to attract the problem. Michelle suggested we place a marigold plant on each table in the herb house to pull any thrips off of the herbs. Then when the marigold plant had many thrips, we replaced it with a new marigold plant and took the old marigold plant to the compost pile. Michelle reported that nearly all the thrips went to the marigolds, and very few thrips could be found on the adjacent herbs.

Did you happen to see our Aphid Guard barley grass plants? Not for sale, these plants supplied food to our aphid parasites and predators. Our cat Jack loved them too, chewing on the grass, which somewhat disrupted our project. Next year, we are thinking of putting the Aphid Guard barley into hanging baskets, so Jack can not get to them!

I truly love the fact we are becoming more "Eco-friendly". Anytime you visit and would like to know more about what we have done just ask or visit at Apple harvest on Oct. 11 because IPM labs will be here from 12-2 to show you benenficials and answer questions.

# 2nd Year of Guardian Plant Research With IPM Laboratories

Guardian plants protect other plants from pests by pulling the pests away from crop plants, and by supporting natural enemies. For the second year IPM Laboratories tested eggplants as Guardian Plants against the greenhouse whitefly. The eggplants attract the whitefly more strongly than most of the other

greenhouse plants and serve as a reproduction site for the whitefly parasites.

What we have learned was plants talk to us all the time. It takes practice to learn to read their messages. The eggplants predicted which direction the whitefly population was headed in the greenhouse and told us that

the whitefly parasites were reducing the population.

# Guardian Plants Entered into Kathy Pufahl Memorial Container Design Contest

I had Bakers put together a lovely mixed hanging basket of Guardian Plants for IPM Labs to enter into the Kathy Pufahl Memorial Container Design Contest at the Cornell Floriculture Field Day Program. The hanging basket contained Gartenmister Fuchsia, Bonanza marigolds, sweet alyssum, barley, sweet potato vine, and lantana....IPM Laboratories has used each of these plants to indicate pest presence and serve for beneficial release sites in our greenhouses.
